
DESTINATION OKLA HOMA!

Fourteen counties of scenic parks, mountain ranges, plains and prairies, wildlife management areas, Western and Native American heritage, arts and culture, shopping, fairs and festivals, museums, historic sites, water sports, camping, fishing, hunting and outdoor recreation. Get ready for great times in Great Plains Country!

Quartz Mountain Resort & Lodge—set deep in the ancient hills of the Wichita Mountains, this multi-million dollar resort is perfect for your group stay. Western Prairie Museum—housing period stagecoaches and other remnants of our western heritage.

Medicine Park—tucked away in the shadow of Quartz Mountain, this picture-perfect resort town is unique in architecture and personality.

Chisholm Trail Heritage Center—home of the largest monument in America dedicated to the Chisholm Trail and the longest Chisholm Trail Walkway in the world.

Frederick—the 'jumping off point' for the adventurous Abernathy Boys, who rode alone on horseback to New York City in 1910—at the tender ages of 6 and 10.

Historic Route 66—in addition to having lots of drivable miles of Rt. 66, there are two museums dedicated to the Mother Road: the National Route 66 Museum & Old Town Complex in Elk City, and the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum in Clinton.

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Cowboys & Oil Barons Alive & Well... KAW LAKE

The Kaw Lake Area covers a fifty mile radius from Tonkawa and Blackwell on the west to Cowley County, Kansas on the north; Pawhuska on the east and Perry on the south... all with Kaw Lake in the middle. It sits half in Green Country and half in Red Carpet Country.

In Ponca City, tour Oil Baron and Oklahoma's 10th Governor E.W. Marland's Grand Home which houses the 101 Ranch Museum and several other exhibits. Marland's second home, the Marland Mansion, is a virtual *"Palace on the Prairie"*. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, it also includes the Bryant Baker Art Studio, Marland Oil Museum, and chauffeur's house, known today as "Lydie's Cottage." Tours start daily at 1:30 p.m. To schedule other tours: 580.767.0420.

Other Ponca City attractions include the newly-remodeled Pioneer Woman Museum, Standing Bear Park, Ponca City Art Center, Poncan Theatre, Conoco Museum and more. Eight casinos dot the Kaw Lake area.

If you're into genealogy or antiques, Blackwell is the stop for you. The Top of Oklahoma Museum in the Electric Park Pavilion holds artifacts including antique lace, old farm equipment, vital records and historic photos of the area. Numerous annual events bring people back again and again.

Perry is just south of Kaw Lake off I-35 and serves as the

gateway to the Cherokee Strip. Learn about its history at the Cherokee Strip Museum, a fiveacre complex that includes indoor and

outdoor exhibits, an implement building, one-room schoolhouse and shaded picnic areas. View sculptor Jim Franklin at work in his studio located on the square. Visit the Ditch Witch Heritage Center and Museum that traces the company's history.

On Kaw Lake in the winter the Ultimate Eagle Watch is a great destination for your group. It is held the third Saturday in January, weather permitting. Accessible to all ages, it includes indoor programs, free Native American lunch and guided tour to locations around Kaw Lake to view eagles in their native habitat. Highlight of this event is the appearance indoors of a live eagle from the Sutton Avian Research Center.





Oklahoma's Largest Lake... LAKE EUFAULA

What was once a hide-out for outlaw gangs is now a hang-out for visitors, retirees and outdoor enthusiasts.

With over 600 shoreline miles, Lake Eufaula is the 15th largest man-made lake in the United States and the largest within Oklahoma.



Lake Eufaula's colorful history includes Civil War battles, the old Texas Trail and the Ft. Smith Santa Fe Trail, where more than a thousand covered wagons traveled west each week in the 1830s. Remnants of some remain for the visitor to see today.

In Eufaula, the community boasts a 20-block downtown listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Browse antique to art shops, enjoy weekend entertainment at the Plumb Theater, and stroll through the Eufaula Inspiration Garden, where scents from roses and other flowers float in the air.

Area attractions and activities include the Honey Springs Battlefield, site of the largest of many Civil War battles that took place in Indian Territory. Nearby Rentiesville hosts the annual Labor Day *"Dusk 'til Dawn Blues Festival"*. Checotah is the hometown of country music star Carrie Underwood. The Heartland Heritage Museum features the area's rich rodeo history and Creek Nation culture.

EASTERN OKLAHOMA LAKE EUFAULA



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The Land of Natural Wonders... **RED CARPET COUNTRY**

Make tracks for northwest Oklahoma land of massive mesas, rugged buttes and gypsum sand dunes. The constantly changing landscape of Red Carpet Country is the home of natural wonders found only in this part of the Sooner State. It is also home to the Cheyenne Indians.

Red Carpet Country gets its name from the vast prehistoric sea that once covered Northwest Oklahoma. Experience towering sand dunes at Little Sahara State Park near Waynoka and Beaver Dunes State Park in Beaver. Visit the Marland Mansion in Ponca City, Oklahoma's magnificent 55-room *"Palace on the Prairie."*


Head for the Salt Plains National Wildlife Refuge near Jet, the only place in the world where you can dig for hourglass selenite crystals. It's also a major birding habitat. Go underground at Alabaster Caverns State Park with a tour of the world's largest alabaster cavern open to the public. Get a taste of the Wild West at the Cherokee Strip Stampede Rodeo in Enid, the nation's fourth-largest PRCA rodeo, or try your hand at the world's largest cow-chip throwing contest in Beaver. Walk in the dinosaur tracks, and then climb Black Mesa near Kenton, Oklahoma's highest point, where stargazers camp out on sweeping plateaus to study the stars.

Black Gold Territory

DAY ONE Bartlesville

Frank Phillips Home – The original home of oilman Frank Phillips and his family remains unchanged since 1930. It depicts the lives, tastes, fashions, and values of the Phillips' and their world during the first half of the 20th century.

Price Tower - Frank Lloyd Wright's only realized skyscraper. Wright took his inspiration for the cantilevered design from a tree, thus "the tree that escaped the forest".

Phillips Petroleum Museum – state-of-the-art historical museum features the people who made Phillips Petroleum Company a world energy leader.

Dewey

Tom Mix Museum - Pays homage to the first super star cowboy. Bartender to cowboy on the 101 Ranch, to movie star - the museum features every aspect of Tom's life.

Dewey Hotel - Restored Victorian Hotel adjacent to the Tom Mix Museum

Prairie Song – A replica Western town with more than two dozen buildings, provides sweeping views of the scenic high plains. An ideal location for a group meal.

Overnight – Bartlesville

*OK Mozart Festival – Ten day music festival held each June in Bartlesville.

DAY TWO Bartlesville

Woolaroc – Hidden away in the rugged Osage hills is the ranch retreat of oilman Frank Phillips. The ranch is a 3,700 acre wildlife preserve, home to many species of native and exotic wildlife such as buffalo, elk and longhorn cattle. The museum houses an outstanding collection of western art and artifacts. Native American materials, and one of the finest collections of Colt firearms in the world.

Pawhuska

Immaculate Conception Catholic Church – "The Cathedral on the Osage" was established in 1887 to serve the Osage Catholics of Pawhuska. The Gothic-Style brick church features twenty-two magnificent

stained-glass windows, made in Munich, Germany that have been widely praised for their artistry and detail. Ponca Citv

Standing Bear Park and Museum - Welcoming you is the 22 foot tall bronze sculpture of Ponca Chief Standing Bear: he overlooks the beautiful 63 acre park and museum. The Center is dedicated to educating all nationalities about Native American heritage and the important role they played in developing our country's diverse culture.

DAY THREE Ponca Citv

Conoco Museum - Exhibits depict the growth of a company born from the early days of a kerosene distributor and the wildcat days of the Cherokee Outlet, to an international energy empire.

Marland Mansion Estate – The story of oilman E.W. Marland is fascinating and his home is an architectural wonder. The roaring-twenties come to life in this 43,000 sq. ft. "Palace on the Prairie" and the family story still turns heads.

Pioneer Woman Museum - Created to honor the spirit of the women who played a significant role in the settling of this part of the country, twelve miniature statues toured the country and votes were cast for the favorite.

Grand Home - Mr. Marland's first home in Ponca City houses fascinating artifacts from the 101 Ranch, an archeology display and Native American artifacts of the Plains tribes.

DAY FOUR Blackwell

Top of Oklahoma Museum – Housed in the 1913 Electric Park Pavilion are exhibits chronicling the expansion of the Cherokee Strip. Stretch your legs as you browse Main Street's eclectic shops.

Perry

Cherokee Strip Museum and Rose Hill School - Explore the remarkable events and people who made up the history of the Cherokee Outlet.

Charles Machine Works/Ditch Witch - In the 1940s the process of installing residential utility services electric, gas and plumbing lines – involved slow, tedious pick-and-shovel labor. Ed Malzahn's idea was to create a compact trencher that would dramatically reduce the time and effort of this process - thus the Ditch Witch was created.



MARLAND MANSION ESTATE, PONCA CITY



In the 1830s the Cherokees and Creeks were two of the Indian tribes forced out of the southeastern United States, and resettled in what is now northeastern Oklahoma, an area resembling their original homeland.

DAY ONF Muskogee

Several attractions detail the history of this area: a stepon guide can certainly enhance your tour.

Five Civilized Tribes Museum – Showcases the extensive art collections of the Cherokee, Chickasaw, Creek, Choctaw and Seminole Nations.

Three Rivers Museum - Dedicated to preserving the history of the American Frontier. The Museum is named for the convergence of the Arkansas. Verdigris and Grand Rivers.

Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame - Dedicated to recognizing the significant impact on the music world by Oklahomans.

Muskogee War Memorial U.S.S. Batfish - Explore this WWII submarine, the cornerstone of the War Memorial Museum.

Thomas-Foreman Home - Historic home featuring Native American and military items.

DAY TWO

Ft. Gibson

Ft. Gibson Historic Site and Interpretive Center – A must see, this National Historic Landmark features an 1824 stockade, log fort replica, museum and National Cemetery.

Tahleguah

Cherokee Heritage Center – The Center includes the Cherokee National Museum, the premier cultural center for Cherokee history; Diligwa, a 1710 Cherokee village which gives the visitor an enhanced experience of Cherokee life; and the Adams Corner Rural Village represents life in the 1890s.

Lunch and Shopping – Quaint downtown shops, galleries and eateries offer a variety of options for travelers.

Park Hill

George M. Murrell Home - Certified Trail of Tears site and National Historic Landmark. George's wife's uncle. John Ross, was Principal Chief of the Cherokee Nation from 1828 until his death in 1866.

Overnight – Muskogee

DAY THREE

Rentiesville

Traveling south on Hwy 69, take a bit of time to visit Rentiesville and the Honey Springs Battlefield, where the largest Civil War battle in Oklahoma took place 150 years ago on July 17, 1863. Tours can be arranged.

Lake Fufaula

Oklahoma's largest lake, Lake Eufaula was at times home for some notorious outlaws, including Belle Starr, "Queen of the Bandits," the Younger Brothers and Frank and Jesse James. Today you'll find restaurants. boutiques and antique and craft shops in this lovely outdoor destination. Check out:

Our Favorite Place - Featuring Oklahoma artists. crafters and periodic art exhibitions. Art or craft instruction classes can be arranged for groups. Made In Oklahoma products are also available.

Plumb Theatre - Home of the Longtown Opry, this theatre has live gospel and country music on the weekends by Paul Maloy (songwriter for George Straight), Jeweltone, Uprights and friends,

Stuffed Olive Restaurant – Where a spectacular lake view is served free with every meal. Eclectic menu offers salad, pastas and desserts, along with seafood, fish and beef.

DAY ONE Sulphur

Chickasaw Cultural Center – The largest tribal cultural center in the United States, consciously departs from the traditional museums' "displays-under-glass" format by using showcases - interactive media stations and hands-on classes - to give the closest connection with the Chickasaw culture.

Gene Autry

Gene Autry Museum – Houses a collection of Old West living memorabilia, movies and music with emphasis on famed Western movie star and singing legend *Gene Autry*, who owned a near-by ranch.

Chickasaw Council House Museum – Showcases one of the largest collections of Chickasaw artifacts. Visit the beautiful Capitol located next door, and the original 1856 log structure *Council House*, located inside the museum for preservation. *Overnight* – *Sulphur*

DAY TWO

Ardmore

Eliza Cruce Hall Doll Museum – Features over 300 rare and antique dolls representing a wide range of historical periods from the United States and Europe.

Greater Southwest Historical Museum – Unique artifacts collected from around the area. Everything from an early electric car to one of the earliest examples of a steam-pumper fire engine can be found here.

Duncan

Lunch and Shopping in Historic Downtown Duncan – A tea room, soda fountain, boutiques, Native American jewelry and 28,000 sq. ft. of specialty shops and antique stores await your visit.

Chisholm Trail Heritage Center – Chronicles the young boys and men, known as cowboys, who were driven by their love of freedom. They faced terrible odds as they moved millions of longhorns; their sharp hooves cut deep ruts in the vast prairies of Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. Their stories however, have left even deeper tracks in American history.

Overnight – Duncan

DAY THREE Lawton

Comanche National Museum and Cultural Center – Provides a glimpse of traditional cultural items and detailed history about the Comanche Nation.

Museum of the Great Plains – Artifacts preserving the culture of the Great Plains. Also showcased are a 1902 depot adjacent to a Frisco steam locomotive, trading post, agricultural implements and prairie-dog town.

DAY ONE Commerce/Miami

Start the day in Commerce, home of #7 Mickey Mantle. See his boyhood home and snap pictures with the larger-than-life statue of the "Commerce Comet" located on the high school ball field.

Coleman Theatre – An extensively restored Vaudeville theater still features performances that entertain audiences on a regular basis. Housed here is a *"Mighty Wurlitzer"* pipe organ.

DAY TWO Grove/Langley

Har-Ber Village – On the banks of Grand Lake 'O The Cherokees in Grove, this collection of over 100 buildings houses a variety of exhibits. It began as a husband's gift to his wife – a small church – and blossomed from there. From a large sawmill steam engine and water wheel to doll, military and gun collections; the Village provides a glimpse of times past.

Pensacola Dam at Langley – This Art Deco style dam was constructed between 1938 and 1940. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is the longest multiple arch dam in the world. Tours are available by arrangement.

Totem Pole Park – This giant totem pole was erected as a monument to the American Indian, an icon on Route 66.

DAY THREE Claremore

Will Rogers Memorial Museum – Pays tribute to the life of Oklahoma's Favorite Son, where several galleries feature art and artifacts of Rogers' life, including Vaudeville memorabilia, detailed dioramas and poignant elements from the fateful Alaska crash. Will's boyhood home is located just a few miles north overlooking Oologah Lake.

JM Davis Arms and Historical Museum – The largest privately owned gun collection in the world is just a portion of this truly unique museum.

Take time to shop downtown Claremore, with over 300 antique and collectable dealers, it's a shoppers bonanza.

Rails and Routes

DAY ONE Enid

Railroad Museum of Oklahoma – Showcases over one million pieces of railroad memorabilia, including a world-class collection of dining car china and silverware, a vast library, photos and videos and an operating HO, N-scale and Lionel model railroads. The rail yard is full of historic engines, cars, cabooses and railroad-related machinery.

Simpson's Old Time Museum and Movie Studio – Fullsized movie sets transport you back into the Old West; visit the saloon, sheriff's office, hotel and general store for a glimpse into the cowboy's life.

Cherokee Strip Regional Heritage Center – Chronicles the history and development of the Cherokee Strip. Meet an array of historical figures and be inspired by the character traits that made them great leaders. **Overnight – Enid**

DAY TWO

Freedom

Alabaster Caverns State Park – For the more active groups, this walk-through gypsum cave is over 200 million years old and features striking selenite formations.

Woodward

Plains Indians and Pioneer Museum – Eclectic collection chronicling the history of northwest Oklahoma; featured items include personal items from gunslinger/lawyer Temple Houston, to a stunning federal quilt from the early 19th century by Anna Markey Garnhart.

Woodward Main Street – check out an array of shops: kitchen, gift, antiques, books and boutiques, there's something for most everyone.

Overnight - Woodward

DAY THREE Elk City

National Route 66 Museum – Transports the visitor through all eight states, from Illinois to California. See quirky roadside attractions luring people in, and get a feel for the experience of traveling down Route 66. Walk through displays of antique cars and historical documents detailing the narrative of America's highway.

Old Town Museum Complex – Features a grand Victorian house showcasing pioneer life, along with cowboy and rodeo memorabilia. Also on the grounds are the *Farm and Ranch Museum* and *Blacksmith Museum*.




